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Matt Gardner Homestead Museum **Quilt Block Unveiling**

The MGHM is proud to be the first venue on the Southern Middle Tennessee Quilt Trail. On display at the farmstead is a painted block replica of a handmade guilt that belonged to Matt's wife Henrietta (Ritta) Jenkins Gardner. The block represents a circa 1920 unidentified southern quilt pattern currently unique to Henrietta Gardner. The unveiling took place Saturday, April 18th, at the farmstead museum. The museum would like to give a

special thank you to Jessie Bains and Todd Camp, students at Martin Methodist College who painted the guilt block. 
